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
Dear pupils, parents and other readers.


The girls from St Thomas More played brilliantly and



Year 9 Trip to St. Mary's

Year 9 went on a trip to St. Mary's church in Denton to deepen their understanding of 'The Catholic Church', one of their key topics being studied in R.E. In this topic they have been learning about the features of the church, the Church community and how the Church acts as a moral guide.

The trip was an opportunity for pupils to look around St. Mary's, talk to Father Peter and ask questions. Pupils were greeted by Father and Sister Dolores and given a talk on what happens at St. Mary's, from baptisms to the Church within the local community to Easter. celebrations

Father gave us lots of interesting information about how the Church prepared for Holy week and what Easter means to Catholics within the parish. He also answered a wide variety of questions such as how the Church helps us to make moral decisions on issues such as the refugee crisis and how we can help to support people during this difficult time. Father also mentioned the things St. Mary's does to support the more vulnerable people within the community, such as hosting food banks and raising money for the homeless through Sister Dolores' sponsored sleep out.

Pupils were then invited to look around the church and look in more detail at the features we have been studying in lessons. Everyone felt very reflective about Father's confessional box and he allowed us to go inside to see how it works! Students also got to look at the children's room, the balcony and of course, the altar. One pupil said their favourite feature was the 'Baptismal font' because it was where they were baptised and felt very special to them to revisit it.

Year 9 returned to school having thoroughly enjoyed their visit, coming back with a wealth of information that they can now use in their work at school. Father left us with an invitation to visit the church over the Easter holiday, which was a brilliant opportunity to develop their understanding even further.

This simple yet incredibly powerful image helped the team to reflect on the struggles that refugees face and our ability to help support those in need through prayer, charity and messages of hope.



I Am Kenzie is a 33-page novella about a young girl called Kenzie Jayden. Her family is not the most supportive or understanding family - in fact, they frequently hurt Kenzie and she doesn't really know how to deal with it.

Kenzie survives through the days until one day when she walks in from school feeling particularly downcast and unhappy. Her father asks her if she has moved on from being the class know-it-all and finally beat somebody up. When she replies with a quiet 'no', her life is turned upside-down. But one girl can change it all.



Recommended Reads



My overall view of this book was a good one. The novel was a perfect balance of humour and sadness. Haddon's use of such a complex character really adds to the book. Haddon must have taken plenty of time and effort understanding the protagonist's (Cristopher Boone) condition, Asperger's to a T; I admire him for this. After completing the novel I definitely advise you to do some research on Asperger's syndrome before you begin the book. It really helps you to understand the way Christopher thinks and acts. You may struggle to understand the numbering of the chapters, however just persevere and all will be revealed.

Critics have called it "outstanding...a stunningly good read"- The Independent. Others such as big names like Ian McEwan have described it as "Mark Haddon's (author) portrayal of an emotionally dissociated mind is a SUPERB ACHEVIEVEMENT...wise and bleakly funny..."

However, my only criticism of this book is the ending it was in my opinion a bit blunt. Despite this, I 100% advise you to read this book. If I was to describe it in word it be: MASTER-PIECE.





A power full odour from the corridor came in and there it was he out...


